Now in its 37th year, Theatre Direct is an award-winning theatre company for young audiences. The company's productions have been seen by thousands of young people in schools and theatres across the country and in international festivals in Canada and overseas. Some recently acclaimed productions include ... And By the Way Miss, Beneath the Banyan Tree, Walking the Tightrope, Head à Tête, Binti's Journey and Sanctuary Song.

Theatre Direct has received numerous nominations, and won six Dora Mavor Moore Awards for its productions, as well as ten Chalmers Awards for playwriting.

Abigail Richardson-Schulte — Composer
Abigail Richardson-Schulte was born in Oxford, England and moved to Canada as a child. Ironically, she was diagnosed completely and incurably deaf at the age of five. Upon moving to Canada, her hearing was fully intact within months. After growing up in Calgary and studying composition there, she received a Doctorate degree from the University of Toronto. Her music has been

commissioned and performed by major orchestras, presenters and music festivals, including the Festival Présences of Paris, where Radio France commissioned a work for the Quatuor Castagneri from her. Abigail won the first Karen Kieser Prize for Canadian music and the Canadian Music Centre Prairie Region Award. Most significantly, she won a first at the prestigious International Rostrum of Composers, after which her music was broadcast in 35 countries. Abigail's opera Sanctuary Song, with librettist Marjorie Chan, (by Theatre Direct and Tapestry New Opera) won a Dora Mavor Moore Award for "Best New Opera" in 2009. Abigail frequently collaborates with her husband, violinist Michael Schulte, who has played and conducted much of her work for national broadcast. Abigail was Affiliate Composer for the Toronto Symphony Orchestra from 2006 to 2009 and is currently Festival Coordinator of the New Creations Festival. Current projects include a work for children's choir and the Gryphon Trio and a choral fantasy for the Elmer Iseler Singers with orchestra and piano. Abigail is Composer in Residence with the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra.



Marjorie Chan Playwright

Marjorie is a multi-disciplinary theatre artist based in Toronto. As a writer, her works have been performed in the United States, Scotland, Hong Kong, Russia and across Canada. She has been artist-in-residence with Tapestry New Opera, Cahoots Theatre Company, Theatre Direct Canada, State University of New York and Theatre du Pif (Hong Kong). Most recently, Marjorie directed

a bilingual, bicultural adaptation of A Doll's House for Theatre du Pif for a soldout run. Marjorie's other direction has included assistant directing Maria Stuarda (Pacific Opera Victoria) and A Synonym for Love (Volcano Theatre), and directing Late (Obsidian Theatre) and the Asia premiere of Knives in Hens for Theatre du Pif. As a performer, Marjorie most recently appeared in paperSERIES (Cahoots Theatre/Magnetic North Theatre Festival 2012 in Calgary), as well as voicing Mrs. Ping on the cartoon Detentionaire for the past three seasons. A five-time nominee, Marjorie is the recipient of two Dora Mayor Moore Awards, one each for acting and writing. She has also received the K.M. Hunter Artist's Award in Theatre for the breadth of her work, as well as a Harold Award for her community contribution to the theatre industry in Toronto. Other notable nominations include the Governor General's Literary Award for her playwriting debut, China Doll, and the Canadian Citizen Award for her work with Crossing Gibraltar – a theatre program for young refugees. Current libretti-in-progress include a contemporary adaptation of Medea, with composer John Harris (Tapestry New Opera/Scottish Opera) and The Lesson of Da Ji, with composer Alice Ho (Toronto Masque Theatre). www.marjoriechan.com

Jamie Drake is a Toronto-based percussionist and drummer with an affinity for chamber music. Viv Moore Choreographer

Born in England, Viv trained in ballet from the age of four, then in jazz, modern and folk, performing in the vaudeville group The Roaring Twenties in Alberta. She has been dancing, choreographing and acting both collaboratively and as a solo artist since 1979. Viv co-founded Remote Control with Dave Wilson, performing and teaching in Sweden, Australia, England and Canada; worked with

community dance in London, England and Canada (Royal National Institute for Blind People, Canadian National Institute for the Blind, deaf and partial hearing, multiabilities, psychiatric survivors); and was National Coordinator of Fight Directors, Canada (Advanced Actor Combatant level). She is a movement coach, choreographer, rehearsal director and outside eye for dance, plays, musicals and films (Theatre Direct, Cahoots Theatre Co. and others). Viv has choreographed for Humber College main stage productions (e.g. Cabaret and Godspell) and has taught Dance and Movement part-time at Humber College since 1985. Viv has also worked with Fujiwara Dance, Sashar Zarif, Holly Small, Allison Cummings (Dance); Theatre Rusticle (Acting); and Theatre Direct (Choreography). Viv has received a Harold Award, a Paula Citron FIDA Award (Bogie Woman) and several Dora Mavor Moore Award nominations, as well as an invitation to dance in London (England) at the English Folk Dance & Song Society. Her solo performance work (e.g. Worcestershire Saucy) is inspired by an eclectic mix of theatre, dance, English Music Hall, English clog and step dance, stage combat and butoh. Viv is a recipient of a Chalmers Arts Fellowship (2011).

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Isolde Pleasants-Faulkner Stage Manager

Isolde Pleasants-Faulkner is delighted to join Theatre Direct's wonderful production, Sanctuary Song.
